\$500 for Horse Show

Mr. Caler has arranged 14 classes of the type most favored by horsemen of this area.

Class 1. Horsemanship, riders under 16 yrs. 1st, trophy; 2d, 3d, 4th ribbons.

Class 2. Novice jumpers: Over 3 ft. 6 in., \$10, \$5, and \$3.

Class 3. Colt class: Colts 3 yrs. and under to be shown as to age: Yearlings, 2 and 3 yrs. old.

Class 4. Road hack: \$10, \$5, \$3, and \$2.

Class 5. Open hunters: To be shown over 4 ft. jumps, 8 jumps to course. Prizes 40%, 30%, 20% and 10%.

Class 6. Pony class: Ridden by children 16 years and younger; \$10, \$5, \$3, and \$2.

Class 7. Mares suitable to become dams: \$5, \$3, and \$2.

Class 8. Ladies' horsemanship: 1st, trophy; 2d, 3d, and 4th ribbons.

Class 9. Open jumps: Over 4 ft. jumps to be raised in case of tie.

Class 10. Saddle horse over 15.2: \$10, \$5, \$3, and \$2.

Class 11. Amateur jumping: Over 3 ft. 6 in., ridden by amateur. \$15, \$10, \$3, and \$2.

Class 12. Saddle horse under 15.2: \$10, \$5, \$3, and \$2.

Class 13. Knock down and out: Started at 4 ft., 40%, 30%, 20% and 10%.

Class 14. Western class: Horse and rider to be fully equipped with eastern outfit. \$10, \$5, \$3, and \$2.

The grandstand which will be erected south of the horse show arena will seat 1500 people.

Continued from page 1 as much importance to the nation as is the factory manager. This will be true for some years to come regardless of the time of the ending of World War II. The average reader has little conception of the size of U. S. agriculture as a business. U. S. farm products will have a value of at least \$10,500,000,000 in 1941 and our farms as of July 1 furnished employment for 11,769,000 individuals.

The wholesale value of our manufactured products for 1941 will be about \$70,000,000,000. This, of course, includes defense business. We are, however, very apt to reach a time when the value of our agricultural products will be very much higher than they are today.

The day may come when industrial products will be manufactured from different and cheaper materials and hence have a smaller value while the quantity of farm products used in manufacturing will result in a much higher importance as well as value being placed upon agriculture as a business. Many types of plastics are already being made from farm products. With the strides chemistry is making thousands of materials embraced in consumer goods will have their origin on the farm.

Conclusion Certainly the farmer can look forward to better days over the near term. The prosperity of the industrial areas is being felt in farming centers and mail order sales are reflecting the increased spending of our farm population. For the long pull a closer tie-up between agriculture and industry promises much. It may be that the increased development of our farming areas from an industrial point of view may do much to cushion the post-war slump.
